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THIRD DAY

St. Joseph, Patron of Workers

Help us to know that as we make sacrifices to provide for ourselves and for our families we cooperate in the providential plan of our Heavenly Father and we reflect God's loving generosity to the world. Pray for us that we may work in harmony and mutual respect with our co-workers and supervisors.



SEVENTH DAY

St. Joseph, Patron of the Unborn Child

ST. Joseph, we invoke you today under the title *Patron* of the *Unborn Child*. Just as God entrusted Mary with a critical role in the Incarnation of His

Son, so too He called you to be intimately involved with this saving mystery. Mary lovingly carried God's Son in her womb for nine months and gave birth to Him. You were given the task of protecting and providing for Him, not only after His birth but also before He was born.

Your first reaction to this surprise pregnancy was to reject any responsibility for the Child. You had not planned on this Child, Joseph. He was not yours. You did not want Him—at least at first. So you decided to walk away from His Mother and from Him. But God had other plans for you and for your home in Nazareth. God had a plan for this Child. The Almighty had formed this Child in His Mother's womb; He knew His characteristics, talents, and potential. The All-knowing One knew this Child and He loved Him. It was God Who had sent Him to Mary and to you—and to us.
